From Landfills to Schools, One Bottle at a Time

We've just embarked on an exciting partnership with Hug It Forward, building School #39 as what's called a "bottle school." And, yes, the school will be built from plastic bottles found at garbage dumps or as litter that trashes the beautiful countryside.

Bottle schools are built using post and beam construction, with concrete columns and beams reinforced with iron. However, instead of cement blocks, they use "eco-bricks." Eco-bricks are plastic bottles that are stuffed tightly with inorganic trash. The eco-bricks are stacked on top of each other then covered with cement to form walls. Children can easily help with this part of the construction, and Miracles in Action is also sponsoring the training of other partner charities in this construction technique.

A School With a Message

The school is located in Patzocón, San Martin Jilotepeque, Guatemala, where over 100 students and their teachers currently work in 3 classrooms. The villagers, including children, will build the school themselves, supervised by an experienced foreman working for Hug It Forward. 

Improving Health and Inspiring Future Leaders

In August, we sent four associates - Pedro Rodriguez, Juan Pablo Echeverria, Shad Qudsi and Mark Arneson – to an Educational Concerns For Hunger Organization (ECHO) training in Florida to learn about sustainable agriculture techniques. The classes covered sustainable farming practices for soil & water conservation, integrated techniques for small-scale farms, underutilized plants & their uses and field case studies from various regions of the world. These men will be sharing what they've learned in a series of workshops in Guatemala.





Student Leadership Training

We're proud to have sponsored 60 students for youth leadership training through Project Seres. Youth Leaders for the Pachamama (Mother Earth) is a 3-day workshop for rural indigenous and disadvantaged youth. In addition to engaging and educating these youth about the region's environmental challenges, the project also focuses on empowerment and leadership, encouraging them to be role models for others in their communities. There's nothing more inspiring than seeing these students transformed by this life-changing experience, ready to take on problems in their communities.
